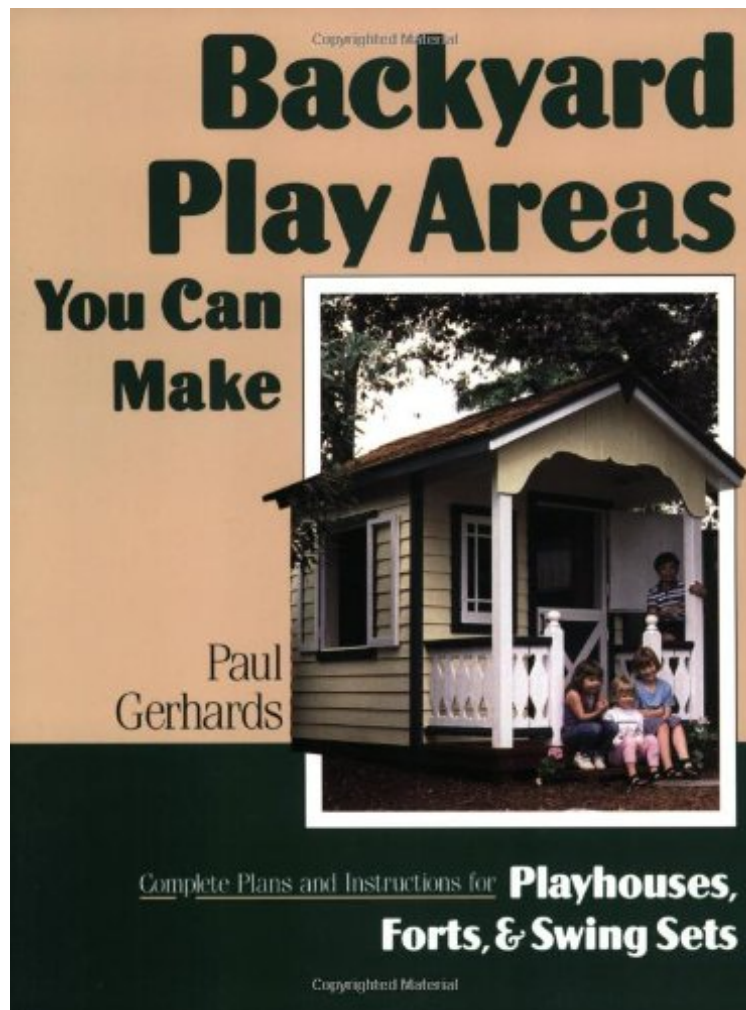

playstructure that has a lot of different playing surfaces--things to climb on, slide, things to swing from. Each project in the book only contains one element--either a swing, or a climbing surface. Most of the projects are actually just a "playhouse"--which is essentially a shed with different looks to each of them. The building plans are far more involved than a person needs for a playstructure for a flat backyard.
